Pleasant Prairie Patriots Swimmer Competes in Tokyo Paralympic Games

In June 2021, the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee announced the U.S. Paralympics Swimming Team members. Amongst the team was Pleasant Prairie Patriots (PX3) swim team member Keegan Knott. She was one of 11 first-time Paralympians on the United States swim team and the youngest swim team member representing the United States in Tokyo, Japan.

Earlier this year, Knott represented the Pleasant Prairie Patriots Swim Team at the U.S. Paralympic Swimming Team Trials held at the University of Minnesota from June 17 to June 19. Her focus, dedication, and placement at the event earned her the spot on the U.S. Paralympics Swim Team.

Knott primarily trains at RecPlex with the PX3 swim team, which emerged in 2011, and was initially known as the Kenosha Barracudas, dating back to 1969. PX3 is a year-round competitive swim team with high-quality professional coaching and technique instruction.

Knott has been involved with competitive swimming since she was seven years old and joined U.S. Paralympics Swimming when she was nine years old. Her competitive swimming background includes competing in the U.S. Paralympics Swimming National Championships in 2018, where she finished third in the 400-meter Freestyle and fourth in the 100-meter Backstroke, 200-meter Individual Medley, and 100-meter Freestyle.

Additionally, in 2019, Knott was named to her first National Team representing Team USA in Lima, Peru. Then in April 2021, Knott was a finalist in her qualifying events at the Para World Series Championships in Lewisville, TX.

Para Swimming sorts swimmers by classifications ranging 1-14. Keegan is an SB8 (Breaststroke), S9 (freestyle, butterfly, and backstroke), and SM9 (Individual Medley) swimmer. In Tokyo, Knott competed in the S9 Classification for Women's 400-meter Freestyle. The games began August 24 and continued through September 5, featuring approximately 4,400 athletes from an estimated 100 countries. □

Nexus Pharmaceuticals



On July 16, Nexus Pharmaceuticals held a grand opening ceremony to celebrate the ribbon-cutting of the new Nexus manufacturing facility, located at 10300 128th Avenue in Pleasant Prairie. Village President John Steinbrink Sr. was honored to be part of the celebration and thanked the Nexus team, Village staff, and many in attendance for their help in bringing the development forward. The new facility represents a significant investment in the community.

Nexus Pharmaceuticals is a welcomed addition to the Pleasant Prairie business community. Looking back to 2020, when Nexus began developing the 16-acre property, anticipation grew as the exterior building shell began to form an exciting design that brought a unique look to the landscape in Prairie Highlands Corporate Park. The company has invested approximately \$100 million into the three-story manufacturing facility, including cutting-edge technologies. The 84,000 square foot building will support the production and supply of sterile injectable drugs. In addition, the company expects to create more than 77 new jobs in high-tech manufacturing, analytical testing, quality control, and supply chain management.

“I want to thank Nexus Pharmaceuticals for choosing Prairie Highlands Corporate Park and officially welcome the company to the Village of Pleasant Prairie,” said Village President John Steinbrink Sr. “I look forward to seeing Nexus continue to grow, thrive in this new location, and to many more tomorrows.” □



HARIBO Shares Progress



On National Gummi Bear Day, July 15, HARIBO shared the progress made at its first-ever North American manufacturing facility, located west of I-94 in Prairie Highlands Corporate Park. HARIBO was honored to welcome Governor Tony Evers and community partners to see the factory progress firsthand. When the facility is complete, it will be used for the U.S. production of sweet gummi treats and bring hundreds of career opportunities to the southeastern Wisconsin region. □

AJ Collectables



During the July 12 Plan Commission meeting, approval for a Conditional Use Permit, including Site and Operational Plans, was given to AJ Collectables Kenosha LLC to occupy an approximate 5,600 square foot space located at 4623 75th Street, Suite #11 within the Center 50 development. The facility will include an indoor recreational area that will provide indoor batting cages and golf simulators, with retail sales of new sports cards, sports memorabilia, and sports collectibles.

“I am glad to see AJ Collectables move into Pleasant Prairie,” said Jean Werbie-Harris, Community Development Director. “The company has two professional establishments in Wisconsin and will make good use of the space by bringing recreational, competitive, and social activities that sports enthusiasts can enjoy.”

AJ Collectables has stores in Greenfield and Hartford. The new location in Pleasant Prairie will be the company's third location and plans to employ four full-time and two part-time employees. AJ Collectables aims to occupy the space beginning September 2021. □

Crumbl Cookies Gourmet Bakery



The Crumbl Cookies franchise is coming to Pleasant Prairie and will be situated within the Prairie Ridge shopping center. The gourmet cookie baking business will occupy approximately 1,400 square feet at 9901 77th Street, Suite 820. The store will sell freshly baked cookies and offer a rotating menu that provides four to five specialty flavors each week.

Crumbl Cookies is known for its selection of over 170 cookie flavors, ranging from a traditional milk chocolate chip cookie to unique flavors like a blueberry crumb cake, which tastes like a blueberry muffin. In addition, the franchise serves chilled cookies, including flavors like key lime pie, pumpkin pie, raspberry cheesecake, and pink sugar cookie.

According to the company website, the inspiration for the unique and delicious cookie flavors comes from popular foods and desserts of all kinds, from pies to cakes to candies and more. The cookies sold by Crumbl are made in-house daily and served fresh in a pink box. Each cookie is approximately four inches across, weighing five to seven ounces.

“The smell of freshly baked cookies is going to be a pleasant addition to Prairie Ridge,” said Jean Werbie-Harris, Community Development Director. “The popular Crumbl Cookies bakery will bring an experience that visitors can enjoy while they shop.”

Crumbl Cookies currently has four Wisconsin locations in Madison, Sun Prairie, Delafield, and Oak Creek. The new location in Pleasant Prairie will be the fifth Wisconsin location and anticipates opening to the community in September 2021. The bakery will employ five full-time employees and 40 part-time employees. Planned hours of operation for the bakery are Monday to Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Friday to Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to midnight, and closed on Sunday. □

Parmentier Concrete

On July 12, the Plan Commission approved Site and Operational Plans for Alex Parmentier to purchase the property located at 3712 93rd Street. The location will continue as a contractor’s storage yard for Parmentier Property Works LLC, doing business as Parmentier Concrete. The company specializes in residential foundations and commercial concrete flatwork and stores small excavation, concrete, and snow removal equipment on the property.

The site was recently cleaned, removing all existing inoperable vehicles, boats, and debris from the property and will now store rebar, lumber, gravel, pipe foam, rock salt, concrete forms, and fuel storage materials. In addition, Parmentier Concrete will use the site to store contractor equipment that consists of dump trucks, pick-up trucks, concrete form trucks, excavators, loaders, and equipment trailers. The site has three buildings on the property, including a 1,764 square foot shop building and two small storage sheds.

“Alex has established rapport with the neighbors and done a tremendous job cleaning up the area,” said Jean Werbie-Harris, Community Development Director. “The property has not been this clean in a very long time; it is a very nice improvement that brought orderliness to the site.” □

A new Claire’s location opened to the community in June. The retail store occupies a 1,692 square foot space at 11211 120th Ave, Suite A20, in Pleasant Prairie Premium Outlets. The global brand creates fun looks for all ages through fashionable jewelry, accessories, cosmetics, and ear piercings. The hours of operation are Monday to Thursday 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., Friday to Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., and Sunday 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. □

Barnes Prairie Wetland Mitigation Bank

On August 16, the Village Board approved an ordinance which changes the land designation on Land Use Map 9.9 to Park, Recreation, and Other Open Space Lands. And approved a Zoning Map Amendment to rezone the portion of property into the C-3, Natural & Scientific Area Resource Conservancy District, following favorable recommendations from the Plan Commission. SR Mills, agent for Mills Holdings LLC, requested the change to create a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WI DNR) Wetland Mitigation Bank known as Barnes Prairie. The area consists of approximately 398 acres of land, generally located between 91st and 104th Streets, west of Sheridan Road.



Mills Holdings began initial studies in 2015 to analyze the WI DNR Wetland Mitigation Bank feasibility. Detailed studies of the soil, vegetation, and hydrology determined the area exhibits unique characteristics that support the restoration of historical wetlands. Wetland mitigation banks restore, enhance, or create wetlands to offset development impacts to existing wetlands. In addition, wetland banks are allowed on land that historically supported wetlands or currently holds degraded wetlands. The area planned for Barnes Prairie Wetland Mitigation Bank exhibits both features.

Enhancement and restoration plans will dismantle the agricultural drain tiles throughout the property. Design engineers will ensure the drain tile disablement does not affect the water levels on offsite or upstream properties. In addition, there will be a gravel maintenance path added over an existing sanitary sewer line within Barnes Prairie Wetland Mitigation Bank. The project will promote native vegetation growth by seeding and eliminating or reducing non-native vegetation, trees, and brush through herbicides and prescribed burns. Although the land in Barnes Prairie Wetland Mitigation Bank is privately owned, the conservative nature of the property will continue even if transferred to another owner. □

Are You Interested in Serving as an Election Worker?

The Village is recruiting Election Inspectors to help manage polling places for all future elections.

About Election Inspectors

Election Inspectors are the gatekeepers of democracy and are vital to efficient, open elections. Election Inspectors are sometimes referred to as “poll workers”; and are responsible for election procedures in their assigned polling location. The procedures include, but are not limited to: helping to open the polls, registering voters, issuing ballots, providing assistance to voters, explaining the use of voting equipment, closing the polling location, and delivery of election returns.

Training and Requirements

Training is required and provided by the Office of the Village Clerk. Training will provide the necessary information and knowledge to be a successful Election Inspector.



On Election Day, inspectors will start work at approximately 6:30 a.m. and work until their duties are completed after the polls close.

To be an Election Inspector, you must be an adult citizen of the United States who resides in the Village of Pleasant Prairie or Kenosha County; be able to speak, read, and write the English language fluently; have strong clerical skills, be able to solve problems, and be an effective communicator; be able to work as part of a team; NOT be a candidate for any office being voted on at the polling location during the election; and enjoy people and service to others.

Construction Complete: HWY H South of HWY 165

A Kenosha County improvement project that reconstructed the roadway between Highway 165 and the Illinois state line is complete. The project began in June 2021 with underground utility work to rebuild drainage along Highway H. Asphalt pavement rehabilitation work followed. The area reopened to traffic in July. ☐



New HWY H Construction: 93rd Place to Bain Station

A new Kenosha County roadway improvement project began in late July on Kenosha County Highway H (88th Avenue) between 93rd Place and Bain Station Road. The road improvements include the addition of new turn lanes to accommodate the new Kroger project. Highway H is closed while construction occurs; however, access to businesses and residences is being maintained. Work crews anticipate completion by late September. ☐



Main Street Market

The Main Street Market development is progressing. The newly reconstructed section of Old Green Bay Road between Highway 165 and 95th Street reopened in June. The road improvements include a median, turn lanes, and shared-use bicycle paths.

Construction of the new Kwik Trip in Main Street Market is underway and is anticipated to be open the second week of October. It will be the Village's fifth Kwik Trip location and will provide neighborhoods in the area with easy access to a convenience store, gasoline, and car wash facility. ☐



GPS Concrete Paver



A new concrete paving machine was used to pave the cul-de-sacs in Ashbury East, operated 100% by GPS via satellite. The machine poured the road and curb without an actual person guiding the machine's path. The paver needed no string line or staking; it was directed entirely by advanced technology. ☐



Police Department Receives WILEAG Reaccreditation



On July 19, Pleasant Prairie Police Department (PPPD) received the highest commendations from Stan Stojkovic of the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG) for achieving WILEAG reaccreditation status.

The WILEAG Governing Board met virtually in May to discuss the April 2021 on-site assessment of PPPD, review the assessment report, and listen to a verbal presentation from the assessment



team leader. As a result, the WILEAG Governing Board unanimously voted to reaccredit the PPPD for three years, effective May 3, 2021. The WILEAG accreditation process is a voluntary commitment to law enforcement excellence; the program assists agencies in serving their communities better.

Pleasant Prairie Police initially became accredited through WILEAG on December 11, 2017. The reaccreditation process ensures PPPD maintains compliance with a body of essential measures to protect life, health, safety, and citizens' rights.

“Being accredited by WILEAG is considered the gold standard of professional excellence in Wisconsin law enforcement,” said Police Chief David Smetana. “Holding a WILEAG accreditation status demonstrates to the community that the Police Department makes certain the agency is following the best policing practices.”

The PPPD underwent the reaccreditation assessment between April 13 and April 15, 2021. The process ensures the agency maintains WILEAG principles and objectives for best professional practices. A trained assessment team was on-site to conduct a thorough review of the department to ensure compliance with the fifth edition of WILEAG standards. WILEAG assessors reviewed written material, interview individuals, visited offices, and evaluated other areas to observe compliance and conduct a report. In addition, the WILEAG team working on the PPPD assessment took public comments by phone.

Once the WILEAG assessors completed the agency's in-person review, they shared their report and findings with the WILEAG Governing Board. The Board acted on PPPD's application request and granted the reaccreditation. Katie Wrightsman, WILEAG Executive Director, congratulated Police Chief Smetana on the outstanding achievement. □

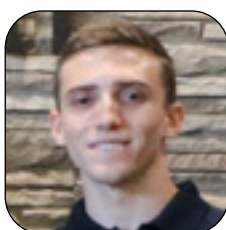

Tom Terwall Memorial

Pleasant Prairie invites the community to the public memorial service on Sunday, September 12, at 2:00 p.m. to celebrate Thomas (Tom) Terwall. The public event will occur at Joe Andrea Plaza, located on the southern side of Prairie Springs Park between Highway 165 and Terwall Terrace. The memorial will include a bench and plaque. Parking for the event is available at the baseball diamond on the south side of the park.



Tom Terwall passed away peacefully in March 2020, at the age of 80, in his home with family by his side. He dedicated his life and diligently served the Pleasant Prairie community in various roles for 41 years. He began serving on the elected Board of Pleasant Prairie in 1977, first as a Pleasant Prairie Town Supervisor for ten years, then as a Town Chairman for two years, and then as the first Village President

for six years. In 1995, Terwall joined the Pleasant Prairie Plan Commission, where he served for 23 years with dedication, including his time in the role of Chairman of the Commission.

Terwall influenced many highly esteemed economic development projects while serving the Village, most notably for creating the first Village Tax Incremental Financing District and the development of the LakeView Corporate Park. The Village sincerely acknowledges Terwall for being a visionary and helping to shape the community of Pleasant Prairie into what it has become today. ☐

Small Cell Towers

Have you noticed these poles around the Prairie Ridge area? They are small cell towers for AT&T. These small towers help reduce the number of prominent cell towers and provides a cleaner signal. They are located where people congregate, such as shopping areas, sports venues, and parks. The towers are more cost-effective for cellular companies that are expanding and upgrading their networks. The small cell towers consume less power and are an alternative to leasing tower space or building new structures.



AT&T has been the only cellular company to apply for and receive permits for small cell facilities. They are adjacent to Chick-fil-A, El Camino Restaurant, and Premium Outlets Mall. ☐

Public Safety Options Assessment

On August 30, the Pleasant Prairie Village Board assessed options to address the financial and staffing challenges in keeping pace with the growing demand for Public Safety services driven by development and population growth within the Village. At the meeting, staff presented the current challenge and need for an additional twelve (12) Firemedics and four (4) Police Officers to maintain the Village's accredited public safety programs. Staff also outlined policy alternatives including: maintaining the status quo, imposing budget cuts and service reductions, identifying additional sources of revenue, and partnering with surrounding jurisdictions.

“We continue to evaluate a way forward to meet Public Safety demands, provide quality service, and manage service delivery in a cost-effective manner,” said Nathan Thiel, Village Administrator. “We look forward to engaging with the community on this topic and bringing the best solution forward.”

Now that the Options Assessment is complete, the next steps towards addressing staffing needs will be to engage community members to review and evaluate these options, and provide feedback to the Village. For the next several weeks, Village Staff will meet with community leaders and organizations to discuss the challenge at hand, and refine and develop a preferred set of options. The Village will also work to conduct a community-wide survey to determine resident preferences for addressing public safety challenges.

Over the past several years, the Village Board and Village Staff have evaluated public safety staffing needs. Specifically, in 2019, McGrath Consulting conducted a third-party review of the Fire & Rescue Department. After an extensive internal review of the McGrath Report and other public safety needs, the Village in April 2021 hired Mueller Communications, a Milwaukee-based public affairs and communication firm experienced in working with municipalities on public education and community engagement. The firm has helped Village Staff assess the current challenge and develop potential solutions. ☐

Wayfinding Bike Signs



Kenosha County provides wayfinding signage around the Village and throughout Kenosha County that identifies the direction of nearby attractions. The signage is a great way to highlight the many shared-use paths around the community. The effort is part of Kenosha County's Comprehensive Bike Plan to create a trail network that provides convenient connections between communities, places of employment, parks, schools, recreation areas, and other popular destinations. ☐

Fall Residential Leaf Collection

As a part of the Solid Waste Services provided in the Village, crews collect loose, un-bagged leaves directly from your curb or roadside. Four rounds of leaf collection will take place this fall. Weather permitting, leaf collection will run from **Monday, October 4, through December 1**. To have your leaves collected, please follow the steps below.

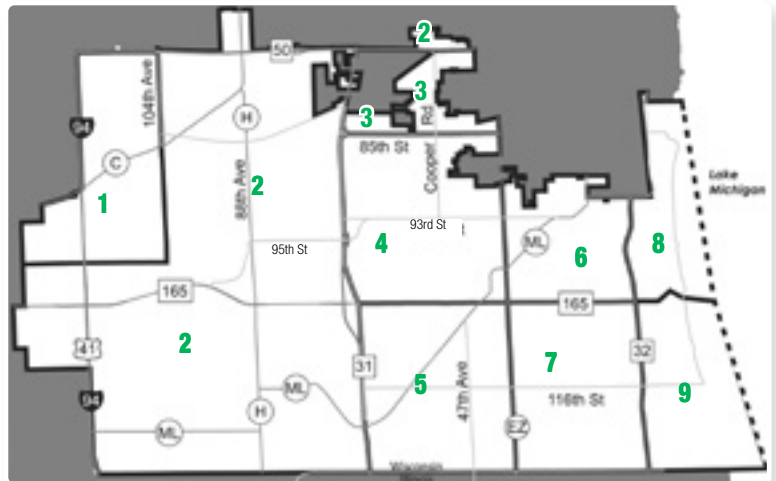
- Identify your collection zone on the map at the right. Then see the schedule to determine your collection dates.
- To prepare leaves, rake all loose fallen leaves into a pile at the curb or roadside by **7:00 a.m.** on the collection dates. Because leaves are collected with a vacuum, the leaves must be piled loose.
- **Leaves must be within six feet of the road and kept off the asphalt.**
- Residents with curbs and gutters, place loose leaves on the grass by your curb.
- Residents with a ditch line, place loose leaves on the grass along the roadside.
- Bagged leaves or grass, branches and other yard waste will not be collected.
- **Do not mix other yard waste, such as potted/garden plants or branches, into your pile of leaves. Doing so can damage the leaf collection vacuum and may cause costly delays. Leaves mixed with yard waste will not be collected.**

Please keep in mind that though collection staff abides by the schedule, there are certain circumstances that may delay leaf collection by one or more days. These circumstances include: delays due to weather, emergency situations that may draw staff away from their regular duties, or damage to collection equipment that would require repair or unscheduled service.

If you miss your scheduled collection days, leaves may also be taken to the Residential Recycling Center at 8000 128th Street. The center will be open for on-season hours through December 3, weather permitting. The Residential Recycling Center will remain open on Saturdays between 7:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. throughout the off-season (December through March). 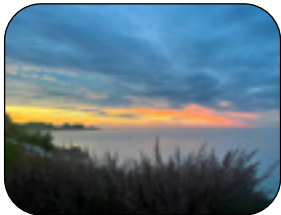
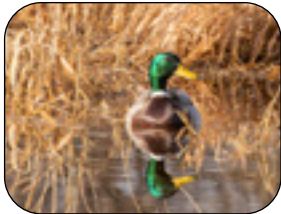

The Historical Society's newest exhibit, “Her League: Women in Professional Baseball,” opened at the Museum Dedication & Fundraiser on August 26.
